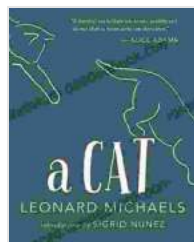


Cat Leonard Michaels: A Journey Through Her Life, Work, and Legacy

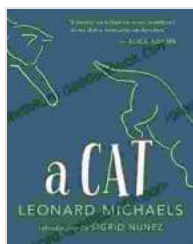
Michaels died in 2013 at the age of 81. She was survived by her two children.

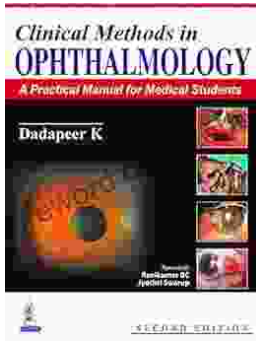
