## Why Washington Won't Work: The Systemic Failures of America's Government





These are just a few of the things that need to be done to fix Washington. It will not be easy, but it is essential if we want to restore the government's ability to serve the people.



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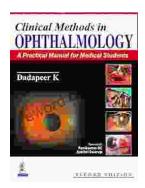
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


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
